

# Kayin to Hashem

Breishis 4:9

### Did you know

Kayin is indirectly responsible for a chapter of Tehillim that we use to usher in Shabbos. The Midrash (Breishis Rabbah 22:13) says that when Adam met up with Kayin following the latter's hearing with Hashem, Adam asked Kayin what judgement he was given. Kayin responded, "I repented and gained a compromise." Adam Ha'Rishon started clapping his hand to his face (in astonishment). He said, "Such is the power of teshuvah and I was unaware!" Immediately, Adam stood up and said, "Mizmor shir l'yom ha'Shabbos".\*

### More for Musing

Rav Tzadok Ha'kohein Mi'Lublin, in his sefer Pri Tzaddik, says that Korach's statement will come to fruition l'asid lavo in Olam Ha'Ba. It is brought in the name of the Arizal that the words Tzaddik ka'tamar yifrach are hinting at Korach. The last letter of each of those three words (kuf from tzaddik, reish from ka'tamar, and ches from yifrach) spell the word, Korach (see Pnei Dovid on Parshas Korach, written by the Chida).
